WHAT: Native American Composer Apprentice Project (NACAP). Recipient of the New Music USA New Music Educators Award and the National Arts and Humanities Youth Program Award from the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities, presented by First Lady Michelle Obama at the White House.

For three weeks in August and September, NACAP teaching Composers-in-Residence Raven Chacon, Michael Begay, and Blair Quamahongnewa tutor talented school students from Navajo, Hopi and Salt River Pima Maricopa Indian Community schools in the art of composition, resulting in new works for string quartet. Students participate in workshops, rehearsals, performances and recordings of their works with NACAP's 2016 ensembles-in-residence The Catalyst Quartet and Sweet Plantain. The student composers' works are performed at Native American reservation schools and the Navajo Nation Museum in Window Rock and Scottsdale Community College, and culminating in world premieres during an all-day NACAP Fair at Grand Canyon Music Festival on Sunday September 4.

WHO: COMPOSERS-IN-RESIDENCE Raven Chacon, Michael Begay (Navajo Nation,) and Blair Quamahongenewa (Hopi); ENSEMBLE-IN-RESIDENCE The Catalyst Quartet and Sweet Plantain. Students from 5 Navajo and Hopi Reservation schools and Salt River High School in Scottsdale.
